"When he tries to touch something that will hurt him or put something dirty into his mouth, his mother tells him 'no'. At first the mother stops the child by grabbing his hands, but as the child grows she just says 'no' and slowly by **reward** and **punishment** teaches the baby to obey her words. The more he obeys her, the more protected he is. As the child grows the mother continues teaching the child what can harm him and teaching him how to obey her. So, the child is protected

from things like getting run over by a car, drowning, and all the other dangers that surround us every day of our lives. As the child gets older and older and is more alone in the big wide world, he is still protected by his obedience to teachers, policemen, doctors, and other grownups."

Mona looked again at Riaz with a funny look on her face and said, "Riaz, how have **you** managed to survive all these years?" Everyone laughed.

"Only by the grace of God, I think," sighed Mother.

"Now, Shahla, think about traffic lights. If people said, 'I don't want to stop at that red light and you can't make me!', what do you suppose would happen?"

Everyone looked at Shahla, and she said in a quiet voice, "I guess there would be a lot of car wrecks."

"Duhhhh," said Riaz as he rolled his eyes. Shahla responded by sticking out her tongue.

"So we have to have everyone obey the traffic laws or else no one would be able to use the roads. How would we go anywhere without being killed? But the virtue of obedience needs to be learned as a child, you can't suddenly start being obedient when you grow up."

"So, that's why there are people who steal things, right?" said Shahla. "If everyone had learned to be obedient as a child, nothing would ever get stolen!"

All the children thought that sounded like a great idea.

Mother continued, "It is the same with all the laws of a country; what peaceful, prosperous countries we would live in if everyone were obedient. Also, all the different countries of the world need to obey the international laws, so that our planet can be safe and clean."

## Birth of Baha'u'llah

In the beginning of time, God made a promise. He said that He would never leave us alone, but would always help and guide us. God kept His promise and from time to time sent His Messengers to the world. Moses came and Krishna, Jesus,

Buddha, and Muhammad. These Holy Messengers of God also gave a promise...That one day two Great Ones would come to make the whole world a wonderful place to live in.

In the early 1800s, in every country, people were waiting for these Two Promised Ones. Many people had dreams about that wondrous day that was soon to come. The trouble was that most of them did not understand how it would happen. They should have known, because God always sends His Messengers in the same way, like everyone else. They are born into the world as little babies.

However, although the Messengers of God are born into the world just like you and me, They are very, very special, because They shine with the Light of God. And when we love and obey Them, it is the same as loving and obeying God.

Some people know when a Messenger of God is born even without hearing about it, although most of us do not know until we are told. There were some Holy men in Persia who knew when the Promised Ones were born.

The Names of the Promised Ones were the Bab and Baha'u'llah. The story of the Bab we will tell another time, this story is about Baha'u'llah.

In the land of Persia was a rich king who lived in a Palace. Many important people worked for the king, and they, too, lived in grand houses and were rich. One of these important people was a good man who, although he had a lot of money, was generous to the poor people and there was much happiness among the people who lived in his villages and in his farms.

Early one morning, on 12<sup>th</sup> November 1817, a baby Boy was born to this good man and his wife.

At that very moment, in another part of Persia, a man




called Haji Hassan was praying. The sun was just beginning to climb into the sky when he bowed down to the ground saying over and over again: "God is the Most Great! God is the Most Great!" Then he turned and said to a young man watching him that at that very hour the Light of the Promised One was shining into the world. Baha'u'llah had been born!

At the same time Shaykh Ahmad was a holy man sent by God to prepare the hearts and minds of the people so they would know the Promised One when He came. It was because of the teachings of Shaykh Ahmad that Haji Hassan had known the Promised One was coming.

Shaykh Ahmad also knew that Baha'u'llah had been born, and he prayed that one day everyone in the world would find this Hidden Treasure of God. Baha'u'llah is indeed a Treasure, more precious than gold because when people turn to Him they become rich with goodness, love, happiness and peace. And however much gold you have, you can never buy those things.

The good man and his wife loved the baby Boy very much. They did not know that their Son was the Promised One, but they knew that there was something special about Him. His father dreamt that he saw

Baha'u'llah swimming in a huge ocean. His body shone like a light upon the waters and His long black hair floated around His head. Many fish were attracted by the light shining from Him, and they gathered around His head, holding only each hair. But although there were so many, Baha'u'llah was able to swim quite freely wherever He wished.

One day, the king of Persia asked Baha'u'llah's father for a lot of money which he could not pay. Even though He was only seven years old, Baha'u'llah went to the king and explained so well, how His father could not pay so much, that the king realized that he had been unfair.


Although He was brought up surrounded with fine things and important people, Baha'u'llah preferred to spend His time in the woods and countryside, praying to God and helping the poor.

## Materials


Crayons or markers Decorations (lace, yarn, cloth) Pencil Poster board or stiff paper Scissors Waribashi (or straw) Tape


## Directions
